Russian 2

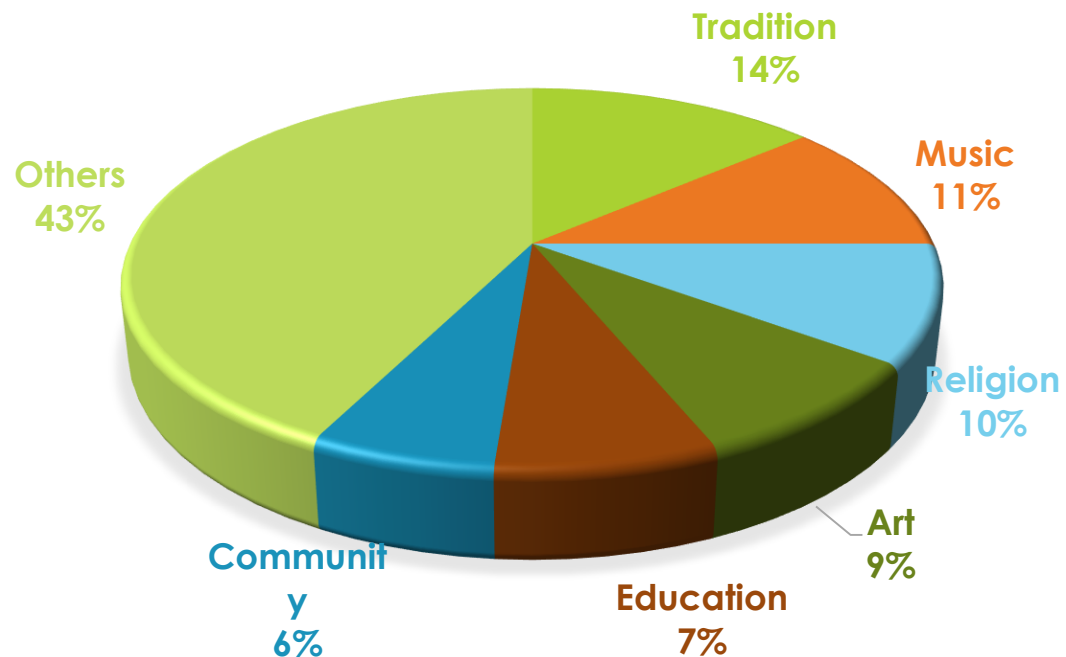

 - Oktoberfest

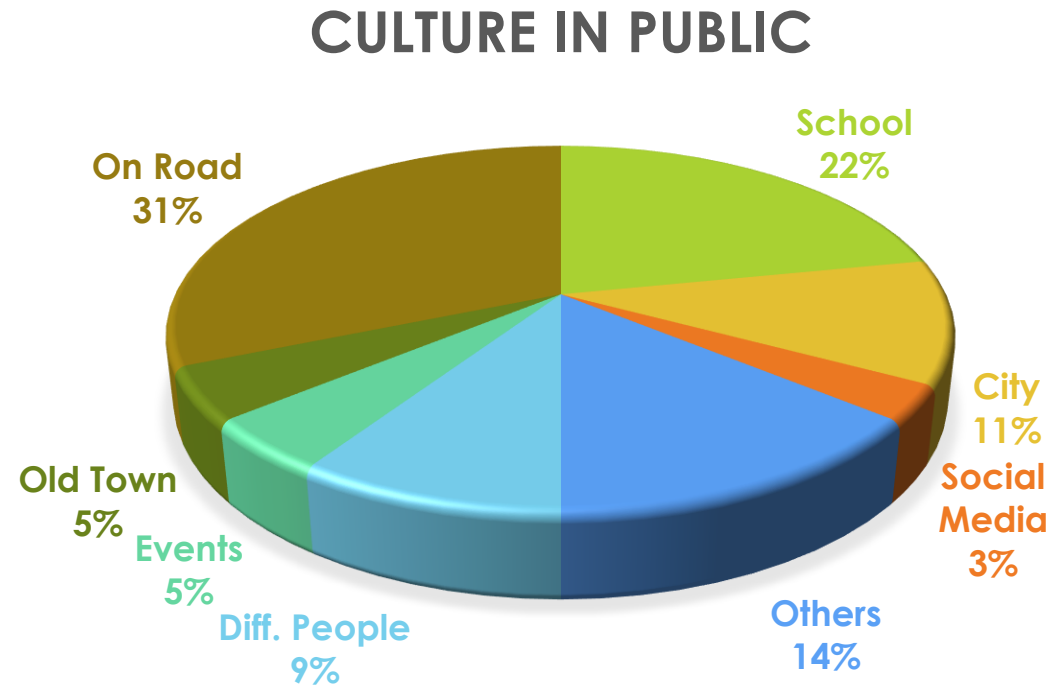

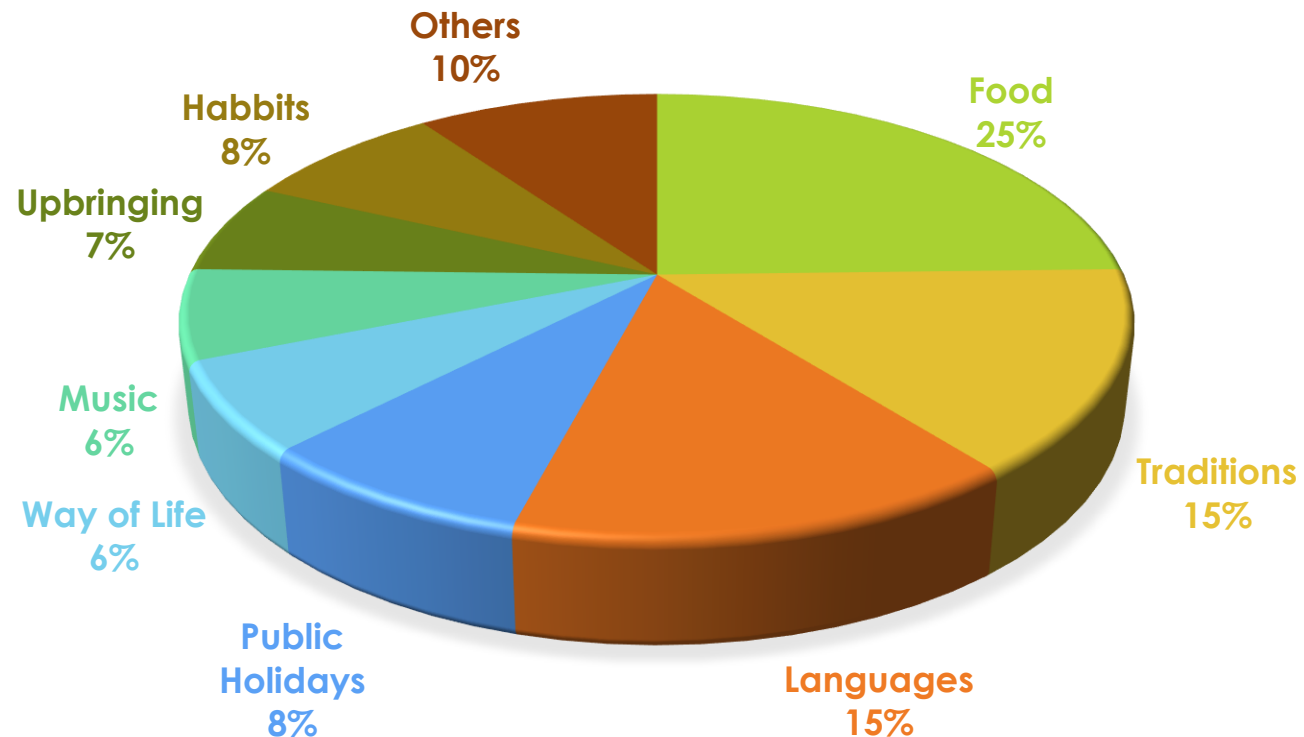
